TASK FORCE TEAM UPDATE

Hello fellow Lions,

I have received several inquiries pertaining to the wildfires burning in the Hemet and Big Bear areas. They were asking how the Lions Clubs can help. Here's how District 4-L5 functions during emergencies and how clubs can function during emergencies.

First, we will start off with the district. District 4-L5 is a member of the San Bernardino County V.O.A.D (Volunteer Organizations Active in Disasters). This organization coordinates and activates member community organizations to serve when requested by the County Office of Emergency Services. This prevents unorganized efforts during a time of crises. At this time, The V.O.A.D has not been activated by the County. Once activated, I would be notified of the needs, and if the district can meet them, then the District Governor and I would activate the District Task Force Team to serve.

Next question, can Lions Clubs, in or out of the area, show up and help to bring resources to the affected area? The answer is both yes and no. Let us start with the 'no' first.

It has been thought that individual Lions or Clubs can show up and help at a shelter, such as the Red Cross or another organization. Starting with the Red Cross, they only accept volunteers who have gone thru their training and screening programs. The Red Cross mostly takes monetary donations in place of physical items brought to their shelters or aid stations because they may not be able to store the number of items that show up. You could ask what their needs are and act accordingly. Other organizations may have the same policies.

It has been also asked if clubs can bring things to the Firefighter's Camps. Once they are established, they are self-sufficient. Bringing physical donations such as food or other items will more than likely be kindly turned away, for the same reasons of storage, non-vetted items. SO THEN, what can you do?

Here are some suggestions: The Club or Clubs in the affected area can pool their resources and talents together and ask the municipality what the needs are. If needed, you can serve in that capacity. You can still ask the Red Cross what their needs are and supply if asked and invited.

Think about what the Club or Clubs can do AFTER the disaster and/or event. There is clean up, clothing needs, long term food needs for the victims. This is often overlooked. If your club is fortunate enough to have funds to match a grant from LCIF for a specific after disaster need, you can apply for one. However, call the district's LCIF chair for information. They have specific guidelines for them. The district Governor then forwards it to LCIF.

I hope this Letter helps explain the ways to help and how District 4-L5 Lions Clubs can be team players in the overall picture of emergency situations. Please feel free to call me or Governor Linda with any further questions you may have.

From the California Lions Foundation

Over the past year CLF has approved grants to several Lions Clubs within District 4-L5. Back-to-School grants of up to \$2,500 per district were awarded to five 4-L5 clubs between September 2021 to January 2022. Grants ranged from \$350 to \$800 to the five clubs. District clubs that participated in the Back-to-School program were Calimesa Breakfast, Colton, Corona, Nuview, and Yucaipa Valley.

Environmental Grants have been awarded to Cali-Caipa Nooners and Highland, both of which are still ongoing due to heat and COVID. A matching Grant was also awarded to the Greater Palm Springs Lions Club. Current CLF grants are available for Diabetes projects. There is a cap of \$3,000 per district and grants are limited to \$500-\$1,000 per club up to the district limit of \$3,000 between September 1st and November 30, 2022. There are several clubs that have expressed interest in a grant for diabetes, so if you are interested, please contact me as soon as you can.

As you know the California Lions Foundation approved grants program is only available to Lions Clubs within MD4 and each district receives the same dollar amount, so larger districts receive no more than smaller districts. Money for grants comes from your Lions Club, so I encourage each club to consider adding CLF into your yearly budget.

HAVE YOU HEARD ABOUT LIONS UNIVERSITY?



It is a Comprehensive Lions Club Leader Development Program available to **every** Lion club member!

Classes are on-line, self-paced year-round and only take about one hour each to complete.

Each class has a short knowledge quiz at end to assess understanding and once completed you will receive a certificate of completion.

To be awarded a Bachelors, Masters or Doctorate in Lions University, Lions must complete 10 required courses and at least 5 electives of their choosing. Once these classes are complete you can apply for graduation!

Easy!

To receive your diploma, you must then personally attend one of the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forums that are held annually. **The good news is the 2023 Forum will be held in Reno, Nevada!!** So, if we can get several club members from our district to complete this interesting training over the next year maybe we can travel together to this and have a graduating 4L5 class celebration!!!!

Who's in???

Bachelor's Program: This program allows Lions to develop the skills necessary to lead a vital Lions Club. Courses are directed to the skills needed to be a great club leader.

Master's Program: This program focuses on giving support to clubs through district leaders. This program is aimed at District Level Leaders - District Governors, Vice District Governors, Zone Chairs, District Committee Chairs, Certified Guiding Lions, and other leaders that are ready to foster quality clubs in their District.

Doctorate Program: This program focuses on skills needed to be a training facilitator for adult volunteers. In effect, Lions who have completed the Doctorate Program are prepared to be great trainers of other Lions.

Leo Clubs/District Adviser

Coach Jim Graver started the Leo Clubs in 1957.

LEO: Leadership, Equality, Opportunity Later, Equality was later changed to Experience. The focus is on individual and social development, leadership skills and community service.

In October 1967, the Board of Directors of Lions Clubs International adopted the Leo Club Program as an official program of the association.

Clubs may be school, or community based. Middle/high school age ages 12 to 18 years old. The Alpha Leo college level, Omega, ends at age 30. Transitions from Leo to Lions is encouraged when graduated from high school. There is also a Cub Leo level for younger ages with no annual fee to LCI. There are no dues required from Leo members, the annual club fee to LCI is \$100 per club name and usually the sponsoring Lions club pays the annual \$100 fee for the middle and high school clubs.

Various LCI awards are available for clubs, individuals and also Lion/Leo collaboration for projects done together.

Currently there are over 7,000 Leo Clubs worldwide with 175,000 members in 145 countries and territories with over 24,038 projects successfully completed from clubs that do report.

Leo Clubs of 4-L5 have participated in projects such as cleaning beaches, fundraising for victims of natural disasters, school's needs, yard & Church cleanup, providing a bench for the school, teaching persons how to use computers and cell phones. Donations to LCIF for families/children, assist in various ways for homeless, assisting in Lions projects and so much more.

Each club has officers, meetings and choose their own identifications such as t-shirt, hat, scarf of Leo members and club officers' choice. The Leo Club is autonomous from the sponsoring Lion Club and each are to be respectful with interactions yet responsible for keeping each other informed on projects. Service hours are earned as they learn about teamwork, leadership skills, need for service.









Leo Clubs are asked to keep District Adviser informed quarterly of projects so at district meetings the information of the youth can be shared. Send information and photos 1 week before district meetings please.

Any Lion club interested in starting, restarting, or terminating a Leo Club is asked to contact Lion Vita. Any questions or difficulties that need to be addressed also contact Lion Vita.

INTERVIEW with a LION



Can you tell us about your Lions journey?

I have been a Lion a little over a year and proudly serve with the North Fontana Centennial Lions Club. Shortly after my husband, Lion Miguel, found out he was diabetic, Teresita Pines and the Lions Clubs were offering an adult camp. My mom requested that her club sponsor him so he could attend. By Rialto Host Lions Club sponsoring him, he not only got the needed education to control his diabetes without medication, but he also started feeling passionate about what the clubs do in the community. He became a Lion 3-4 months before I did, asked me to join and after a month or so I agreed.

What is your favorite Lions Project?

I have been able to participate in a few projects, but I think my favorite was the sock/hygiene project that was completed by a few clubs. It was great to partner with the other clubs to each bring something to the table and work together to help people in the community.

What does your Lions Club do that makes you excited to be a member?

I love the education we provide for people's health. I'm not a health nut, but I have seen how debilitating diabetes and other health issues can be, and I'm happy to bring awareness to others.

Do you recall any stories of your Lions life that stand out?

Our club did another great fundraising event earlier this year, and it was a lot of fun. Having the other

clubs come out to support our event is what stood out. The funds raised, as well as donations we received, covered the costs of the upcoming juvenile diabetes camp, minus a very small registration fee for the families. Knowing that the fun and education that happens at the camp will be more accessible to families is great and wouldn't have been possible without the support we received from other Lions.

Who are the Leaders (Lions or non-lions) you most want to emanate? (local, world or historical) and why?

So, I enjoy history and learning about other eras, and while there were quite a few difficulties in the 1940s with how people were treated, I think the example that was set by just about every person was great. Men and women volunteered to serve during the war, people back home stepped up to fill in positions in the workplace that were necessary to carry on daily life as well as the war effort, and there seemed to be a camaraderie of neighbors. That willingness to step up is great to follow.

What is the best thing in your club and what do you hope for in the future?

I think the best thing is the range of ages, various careers, and different ethnicities. These differences allow us to recognize needs in the community, know of ways to help those needs, and better communicate with people in the community. People in the community will always have needs and Lions will always be there to help. I would like to see clubs continuing to support and help each other using their skills and talents so clubs can collaborate to meet the needs of the community. I think it's important for club members to feel supported in their fundraising and service projects. The 80/20 rule is talked about within clubs, but that is also felt on a larger scale within the regions and districts. Knowing that other members in the regions and district, as well as the leaders of the district, help with these things allows members to know that they aren't the only ones doing the work.

LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL ESSAY CONTEST



Your club can sponsor visually-impaired students in the Lions Clubs International Essay Contest! The contest is open to students who are considered visually-impaired according to their national guidelines, and will be 11, 12 or 13 years of age on November 15, 2022. Eligible birthdates are November 16, 2008 through November 15, 2011.

One grand prize winner will receive an award and US \$5,000.

The contest theme is

"Lead with Compassion."

- · Only a Lions club can sponsor the contest.
- The contest may be sponsored in a local school or organized, sponsored youth group, or individuals may be sponsored as well.
- Essays must be no longer than 500 words, submitted in English, typewritten in black ink and double spaced.
- Each essay must be submitted with a completed entry form. Essays submitted without completed entry forms will be disqualified.
- Only one entry per student per year, and each entry must be the work of only one student.
- Essay entries cannot have already been published.
- Any essays found to be plagiarized will be disqualified, and the student will be prohibited from entering any future Lions competitions.

DEADLINES November 15, 2022 – Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning essay to the district governor. Note: A participating club should notify its district governor in advance of sending an entry.


